

Visitor centre



The visitor centre was officially opened at a special ceremony last month by Leader of Gedling Borough Council, Councillor John Clarke Deputy Leader, Councillor Michael Payne and the Mayor of Gedling, Cllr Viv McCrossen alongside Cabinet members and Vernon Coaker MP.

The centre design was inspired by the history of the former colliery site and its look and feel incorporates the coal shapes and the rural landscape. It was designed by Allan Joyce Architects with some inspiration from Nottingham Trent University students who helped shape some of the ideas for the centre.

Café 1899, named after the date the former mining colliery opened, will serve food and drinks and will have a wide ranging menu from breakfast to brunch. It will also be open 7 days a week and has disabled access and disabled toilet facilities.

The centre took just 35 weeks to build and will have 75 seats indoors and 50 outside on platforms looking over the beautiful Gedling skyline.

The building is made up of a staggering 9,800 breeze blocks

and 2,500 bricks and was built by local firm G F Tomlinsons.

As well as the visitor centre, the park also has 240 acres of green open space, walkways and a children's play area which also incorporates the mining heritage of the site. The car park has also been expanded to meet the demand and with thousands of people visiting the park every week and the addition of the new centre we're sure it will be a huge success.

General Election Results

The turnout in Gedling for the General Election was 73% (51,765 votes cast) and the result was that Vernon Coaker (Lab) is the elected MP for Gedling and Mark Spencer (Con) is the elected MP for Sherwood.

A statue in honour of the mining history of Gedling Country Park is to be built thanks to the Friends of Gedling Country Park who won £18,000 in funding.

The group won the funding from Nottinghamshire County Council's Supporting Local Communities Fund to commission an artist to create a permanent piece of art in the new memorial garden at Gedling Country Park.

We will be supporting the artist to work with local children and community groups to create the centrepiece. It will commemorate the miners who worked and died on the site and provide a focal point for anyone wishing to spend a few minutes in quiet reflection.

The d'honour of a Lifetime

The High Sherriff of Nottinghamshire and representatives from the French Consul presented Gedling resident Don Sutton with the Legion d'Honneur, the highest honour the French can bestow, for his service to his country during the Second World War, at a special ceremony at Gedling Borough Council in May.

Mr Sutton, who is 99 years old, was formally presented with the award by the French Consul in the East Midlands, M. Jean-Claude Lafontaine, for his part in the liberation of France in the summer of 1944. His regiment, the North Somerset Yeomanry, one of the last horseback regiments who fought on horseback, played a large role in the liberation of France.

Mr Sutton's family, carers and senior military officers including the Vice Lord Lieutenant were in attendance and a number of local press outlets were there to get the big story. Congratulations to Mr Sutton on receiving such a prestigious honour, he is a true hero.

We have set up a dedicated customer services Twitter account @GedlingBC_help so that you can now get in touch with us quickly, directly and cheaply. We have staff on hand to answer any queries which should reduce the number of calls made to the council.



This month we launched our new website. It is now mobile friendly, easier to use and much more customer focused. You can find the things you need quickly pay for things easily and report any issues instantly.

We've also designed new leisure and events sites that will be easier to navigate those important swimming lesson timetables or find out about the number of events we run around the borough.

We have spent months rewriting the web content to make it simpler to read. We've used guidelines provided by central government to make sure that the site complies with accessibility and reading levels and we've stripped out hundreds of pages meaning you will find the things you need a lot quicker.

It's Hot and Healthy

The Healthy Options Takeaway Scheme (HOT) encourages takeaways to offer healthier options and let customers know where they can get healthier food. Many local takeaways already offer healthy options but many more could make small, easy changes and get a HOT certificate.

To get a certificate, takeaways can apply online and then an Environmental Health Officer will go out and see if the takeaway meets the criteria for a HOT certificate. If you're a business and would like to apply then visit www.gedling.gov.uk/community/ health/hot/

Support to bring empty homes back into use

We have recently appointed a new full-time Empty Homes Officer to work with the owners of long term empty homes to try to bring them back into use. Properties that are left derelict or disused can be an eyesore and cause problems for people living nearby. Our Environmental Health team work to get these properties back into use and, in some circumstances, can legally require the owners to get the property tidied up. If you know of a property that has been left empty for a long time and is causing problems, get in touch with our team 0115 901 3972 or email environmentalhealth@gedling.gov.uk and they can investigate.











Disabled Facilities Grants can help meet the cost of adapting a property for the needs of a disabled person of any age. Grants can be provided of up to £30,000 depending on the applicant's financial situation.

Typical works include improving access to properties, installing suitable lighting, heating and ventilation or improving access and facilities within the property for cooking, sleeping and bathing. You can also apply for help improving the safety of the property.

To be eligible you must be an owner occupier, private tenant, a tenant in social housing or a landlord with a disabled tenant. Eligibility is based on financial circumstances and an assessment made by Nottinghamshire County Council.

Serving People, Improving Lives


Over the last few years our council headquarters at the civic centre in Arnot Hill Park has transformed into a central hub that supports local people with a range of different things from help getting employed, financial advice, support with housing problems and much more.

The number of free services now available at the civic centre is increasing all the time so we thought we would remind residents of the extra support available here at the Civic Centre in Arnot Hill Park, Arnold.

Monday – Friday 9am-5pm except Wednesday 10am-5pm

Jobcentre Plus offers a range of support to help people get into work. They provide a service that supports people of working age from welfare into work, and helps employers to fill their vacancies. They meet with hundreds of people every month to help offer them support and training to get them back into employment. You will need to make an appointment to see an advisor but you can also get more information about the centre by calling 0345 604 3719.







A national project aimed at getting young people engaged with sport on their doorstep has been piloted in Newstead. Young people from the Newstead Village Youth Club were involved in the Doorstep Sport Club, a project funded by the national charity StreetGames.

The project uses sport and physical activity as an intervention to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour. The sessions have proved to be very popular and have engaged over 50 young people in the area.

The sessions, which were organised by the young people, included Dodgeball, Badminton, Football as well as other team building exercises. The group also met with Neighbourhood Wardens who spoke with them about the importance of reducing anti-social behaviour and results so far in Newstead have shown that, since the project started, the number of incidents have reduced.

Newstead Micropub Opens

A new pub has opened in Newstead thanks to the will power of the local community. The Pit which is situated in the Sports Pavilion on Tilford Road was opened in February by the Mayor of Gedling and ward member Councillor Chris Barnfather who backed the campaign to turn the site into a pub.

The pub, which was due to be demolished, has a new lease of life thanks to the determination of landlady Lorraine Horrocks who gathered 1,150 signatures on a petition asking the council to think again about closing the site.

The Micropub, the technical name for a small pub with only one room, is open six days a week and has space for 60 drinkers and has locally sourced ales, ciders and wine. For the latest updates follow 'The Pit Micropub' on Facebook.

Tour of Britain - Race through Newstead Abbey

Nottinghamshire will host an entire stage of the OVO Energy Tour of Britain, the UK's premier road cycling race, this September including a pass through Gedling. Nottinghamshire is the only county in the Midlands to host one of the eight stages.

Wednesday 6 September will see 120 of the world's top cyclists racing a 175-kilometre stage from Mansfield to Newark-on-Trent. The route will take in Eastwood. Hucknall. Gedling and the

grounds of Newstead Abbey and the centre of Southwell.

After heading through Sherwood Forest and Clumber Park the stage will loop the north of the county and the towns of Worksop and Retford.

It will be the first time that
Nottinghamshire has hosted a start and
finish of a stage of the OVO Energy Tour
of Britain. The race last passed through
the county in 2015 when a stage finished
in Nottingham.

When picking up the award, former miner Graham said "We were just so happy that we'd got all these miners back together and they were all there with their arms around each other."

We spoke with Cheryl Raynor, Grant Manager for WREN to talk about the great work they do.

Cheryal Raynor – Wren Grant Manager

Cheryl, can you tell us a little bit about WREN and what your job is there?

WREN is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community, biodiversity and heritage projects from funds donated by FCC Environment. Since 1997, WREN has provided over £200m to more than 7,000 community and environmental projects throughout the UK.

Over the last few years, WREN have supported a number of projects in Gedling, what is it like for you to see the work that has been done?

For me this is the most rewarding part of my role, to be involved in an opening event and see the excitement on the faces of local people who have often been working hard for many years to deliver a project is truly inspiring.

You will be aware of the difficulties many council's face to keep parks and open spaces supported, what can residents do to help?

It's the support and enthusiasm from local communities for their local park that makes things happen. They don't see their open spaces as simply places for children, but as community facilities and many hold fun days and events that encourage users into the park. People are becoming more proactive and working alongside local authorities to make things happen. Parks are being embraced by local communities for the benefit of everyone. It's great to see.

Planning Update

There are a huge number of planning projects taking place across the borough and we thought it would be a good idea to update you on some of the major works happening in Gedling. of the major works happening in



The Chase is On

Works to build 1,000 new homes on Chase Farm is now underway. The 33 acre brownfield site is part of the council's target to deliver 7,250 homes in the borough by 2028. Full planning permission has been granted to build 506 homes with outline permission granted for the remaining properties. Plans are also in place for a new primary school, health centre, local shops and public open space to provide services for the new residents and the wider community.

End of Chesterfield

The former Earl of Chesterfield pub is to be demolished and turned into a three storey building with three retail units and 14 two bedroom flats. Planning permission was granted to turn the eyesore, which lies in Carlton at the corner of the junction between Carlton Hill, Southdale Road and Southcliffe Road, into a modern building. The renovations are part of the council's long term plan to revitalise Carlton town centre, look out for more new in the coming months.

Gedling Access Road Update

Gedling Access Road, a road to help alieve traffic going through Gedling Village and help support the new homes being built on Chase Farm, is due to commence in Spring 2018. The road will run from Mapperley Plains to the A612 at the Burton Road/Nottingham Road and Trent Valley Way junction. There will be two roundabouts connecting with Arnold Lane and the future development area on the former Gedling Colliery site.

Funding for the £40 million road has come from a mixture of public and private sector funding, which includes Nottinghamshire County Council, Gedling Borough Council, the HCA, Local Enterprise Partnership D2N2 and Keepmoat.


