Leader's column


Welcome to the summer edition of Contacts magazine. As this magazine went to print, a General Election was called and the results of that election will have been announced by the time you are reading this.

In May there were two elections that affect the borough, the first was the East Midlands Combined Authority election, where the first ever Mayor for Nottinghamshire was selected. We will be pushing the incoming Mayor to reassure us that Gedling will receive its fair share of funding to reduce anti social behaviour and improve transport links. New Enterprise Centre to be created at The AMP



Gedling Borough Council has announced plans to create an Enterprise Centre that will support local start ups and small to medium enterprises at our flagship AMP business unit in Arnold.

We have published a report that is allocating a significant investment of £655,000 into fitting out the vacant first floor of the building to boost economic growth and provide a space for offices, conference and training room in the heart of Arnold.

The AMP was opened on the former Arnold Market site in 2022 and is home to several thriving small businesses on the ground floor. We always had plans to develop the first floor space and the project has received £655,000 from the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund so that work

can begin and is expected to be completed by the Autumn.

The project will support several council priorities including revitalising town centres, support economic growth and creating jobs in the area. It will also increase footfall to the town shopping precinct and support the existing businesses in the area.

We have also announced investment plans in the northern part of the town with the purchase of vacant units and the creation of a vision for the entire town centre with the aim of attracting investment opportunities following the disappointment of not receiving any UK Government Levelling Up funding in the latest round of bids.

£20 million towns fund boost

Gedling Borough Council has been awarded a significant funding boost, with up to £20 million allocated over the next 10 years to support community projects aimed at regenerating the area, make it safer and improve connectivity and transport.

This funding comes as part of the Long-Term Plan for Towns, a government initiative designed to invest in local communities and empower them to address their unique challenges and opportunities. The Department for Levelling Up & Communities wrote to the council to inform us that Carlton was one of 55 towns to receive funding following two unsuccessful bids for levelling up for our town centres.

The payments are structured as 'endowment-style', providing the council with the financial stability and flexibility to plan and implement projects over the 10-year programme duration. This approach allows for a more strategic investment in interventions that are closely aligned with local needs and priorities.

There are three themes that the funding could be used for, which are:

- Safety and security
- High streets, heritage, and regeneration
- Transport and connectivity

A critical part of accessing this funding is the formation of a Town Board, which will be made up of community members, local business representatives, councillors, and the local Member of Parliament. The board will be chaired by an Independent Chair, ensuring a balanced and inclusive approach to decision-making. The board's creation and the development of a long-term investment plan are required for the funding to be released.


Community engagement is a cornerstone of the scheme, with a strong emphasis on incorporating the voices and opinions of local residents in decisions regarding the allocation of funds. This approach aims to ensure that investments reflect the community's aspirations and contribute to a shared vision for the area's future.

Elections results

In May and July there were elections to elect the new East Midlands Mayor, the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Parliamentary Members (MPs) for Gedling and Sherwood.

Claire Ward (Labour Party) was elected as the first ever East Midlands Mayor and Gary Godden (Labour Party) was elected as the new Police and Crime Commissioner for Nottinghamshire.

Residents across the borough went to the polling stations and turnout was 27.6% of the electorate across the East Midlands for the Mayor election.

Turnout for the Police and Crime Commissioner was 28.13% of the eligible voters across all of Nottinghamshire.

At the time of Contacts magazine going to print, the winner of the Parliamentary election, which took place on Thursday 4 July, had not been announced but the full result for the Gedling and Sherwood constituencies can be found on the website.

Electric car charging points



We are stepping up our efforts to tackle climate change by setting up electric car charging points. We've converted four parking spaces at the Civic Centre in Arnot Hill Park into spots where you can charge your electric car. These charging spots are equipped with fast chargers that have two outlets, each delivering 7kW of power.

To use these charging points, you'll need to register through the BP Pulse app, as they're provided by BP Pulse. This move is part of the council's promise to be net zero carbon by 2030.

These charging points are ready to use and open to anyone with an electric car. Gedling Borough Council has already set up ten electric charging stations around the borough, and they plan to add more, including at Gedling Country Park, over the next year.

Earlier this year, the council announced that they're switching their waste vehicle fleet from diesel to greener biofuel. This change has already cut CO2 emissions by a huge 90%, showing their commitment to going green.

Free parking to continue in town centres

We are pleased to announce our commitment to supporting local businesses by continuing to provide two hours of free parking in all of our pay and display car parks in town centres.

The decision comes as part of our ongoing efforts to strike a balance between generating necessary income and supporting local economic growth. By maintaining the two-hour free parking provision, we aim to minimise the impact on residents and visitors while safeguarding the vitality of local shopping centres.

The change for parking beyond two hours has changed from £1 to £2 for 4 hours, which is the first increase in 10 years.

Gedling Borough Council is one of only a few councils to continue offering free parking in town centres.

We are also investing in several electric car park charging stations at various car parks and new cycle hubs at key sites as part of our commitment to reduce CO2 emissions.

The increase in charging also aligns with our broader environmental sustainability goals, encouraging active travel and public transport use.

Olympian opens new fitness studio

We are excited to announce the opening of a new fitness studio at Carlton Forum Leisure Centre. The studio was opened on Tuesday 2 April by three-time Olympian, Andy Turner. Hailing from Nottinghamshire, Turner excelled in the 110m hurdles, achieving fourth place in the London 2012 semi-finals.

The new studio was formally a squash court which had been used as extra gym space for customers to use since 2020. Due to the popularity of this additional area, it was decided to repurpose the squash court into a purpose-built fitness studio.

This project was part-funded by the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, from which we received £14,406 towards the refurbishment.

The new fitness studio, located next to the remaining squash court, has been named the D.O.S.E Studio. D.O.S.E represents Dopamine, Oxytocin, Serotonin and Endorphins, which are all 'feel good' chemicals

released in the brain when exercising. These positive chemicals can help to reduce feelings of anxiety, improve a person's mood, and boost the body's immune system.

Customers must be aged 16+ to use the studio, which has a diverse range of equipment such as rowers, ski ergs, kettle bells and much more.

One of the most significant additions to the studios at Carlton Forum Leisure Centre is MyZone. MyZone is a form of wearable fitness technology which allows the user to track their health and fitness while exercising, by monitoring their heart rate. Users can participate in challenges and see their real-time fitness tracking results on the screens in the studios and on the MyZone app.

New lockers thanks to Safer Streets funding

We have installed six new high security, steel bike lockers at the council office in Arnot Hill Park, thanks to funding from the Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner.

Located outside the entrance to the civic centre, the lockers are free to use and aim to promote cycling for people visiting the civic centre or the park. By offering a safe place to store bikes, it will help reduce the number of people travelling to the park by car.

These secure bicycle lockers also contribute to the council's ongoing efforts to provide eco-friendly alternatives to people who would usually travel by car and encourage them to reduce their carbon footprint.

The new lockers are operated using a key which can be obtained from the reception desk or bike owners can use their own padlocks. Each of the lockers can store up to two bikes.

The lockers are funded through the Safer Streets initiative led by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Nottinghamshire and partners. In addition to the lockers,

environmental improvements have taken place to trim back overgrowth and increase visibility for existing CCTV cameras in the park, to reduce blind-spots which might lead to an increase in antisocial behaviour.

The previous round of Safer Streets funding which benefitted Gedling Borough was used in Netherfield and Colwick and saw patrols by street wardens, a new Shop Watch radio scheme, CCTV and free home security devices.

Home Upgrade Grant

The Home Upgrade Grant is a government programme which provides energy-saving home upgrades and low-carbon heating, via local authority funding, to households across England. Nottingham Energy Partnership is working with Gedling Borough Council, Nottinghamshire County Council and contractors to deliver Home Upgrade Grants to homes across Gedling. These upgrades aim to improve the efficiency of homes, making them cheaper to run.


The grant is for hard-to-heat homes that are not connected to the gas network. It aims to make the homes cheaper to heat and lower their carbon emissions.

The energy-saving upgrades available include loft insulation, wall insulation, solar panels and air source heat pumps, depending on availability and what is suitable for each property.

You may be eligible if you own and live in your property and:

- **have an annual household income below £36,000 (gross) or are in receipt of certain benefits**
- **do not use gas as your main source of heating**
- **have an Energy Performance Certificate rating of between D and G.**

New plans for a greener future

Making our communities more sustainable and environmentally friendly is a top priority for Gedling Borough Council. That's why we're excited to share some important updates about how new planning rules are enhancing biodiversity in our area.

The government has introduced new planning regulations aimed at boosting the biodiversity of sites by at least 10%, compared to their previous state before development. The goal is to ensure that any new developments contribute positively to our natural surroundings. Ideally, this increase in biodiversity should happen on-site, but if that's not feasible, alternatives can be considered elsewhere.

To support people and organisations navigating the planning process, the council has released comprehensive guidance on how to enhance biodiversity. The guidance emphasises the importance of cultivating the right types of habitats in the right locations, using natural and indigenous species.

It's important to note that biodiversity creation through the planning system is just one piece of the puzzle in our broader efforts to restore nature across the borough. This initiative aligns with

Local Nature Recovery Strategies, of which 48 are currently being prepared nationwide. Here in Gedling, Nottinghamshire County Council is spearheading this work, and our guidance will continue to evolve as part of this local strategy rollout.

At Gedling Borough Council, we're committed to building a greener, more sustainable future for all. By prioritising biodiversity in our planning processes, we're taking meaningful steps towards creating a healthier environment for generations to come.

We are excited to announce the completion of a vibrant mural on the pavilion at Breck Hill Park, thanks to a collaboration with the 'Friends of Breck Hill Park' group and a talented local graffiti artist.

Inspired by the native wildlife and biodiversity of the area as well as the park's historical significance as a former brickworks site, the mural showcases a stunning array of native wildlife; Song Thrushes, Great Tits, Oak leaves and Pipistrelle bats. They sit alongside subtle nods to the park's industrial past including a Hoffman kiln which was a cutting edge and innovative way of firing bricks at the time.

Nottingham based artist, Alex Rubes created the impressive piece in just seven days, despite being hindered by rain, hail and extreme winds! The stunning art was completed free-hand using spray paint and was Rubes' latest work after projects in Arnold and Nottingham city centre.

The collaboration, spearheaded by Gedling Borough Council in partnership with the 'Friends of Breck Hill Park' group, aims to beautify the park while celebrating its natural wildlife and heritage. This addition to the park comes after other recent developments including a newly built path making the park accessible to all.

New path and entrance thanks to local businessman

We are pleased to announce the completion of a new path and entrance for Breck Hill Park in Woodthorpe. The project, which was funded entirely by a local philanthropist and business leader, will improve the accessibility and safety of the park for all visitors.

The new entrance is constructed from resin bound gravel and leads visitors along the right hand side perimeter of the park. The path links access from Breck Hill Road all the way to the second entrance to the park on Woodthorpe Drive, next to the recently refurbished children's play area.

The works were carried out by Ground Control Ltd, a leading provider of landscaping and maintenance services. The cost of the project, including costs for the new entrance and the 260 metre footpath, was £47,000 and was funded by local entrepreneur, Professor Nat Puri.

The new path and entrance will benefit park users, and improve accessibility for wheelchairs, mobility scooters, or pushchairs. Prior to the works, some local residents reported that they did not use the park in the winter months because it was too muddy and slippery to access from Breck Hill Road. The steep banks along the right hand side boundary also posed a hazard for accessing the playground from that entrance.

The park recently secured its second Green Flag Award and one of the criteria for the award is for 'equal access for all'. The Friends of Breck Hill Park group have been working tirelessly with the council to improve the park, securing funding for over £100,000 for a new children's play area as well as being part of the team who secured this much-needed funding for the new footpath and entrance.

Gedling Business Support Network



The Gedling Business Support Network was successfully launched on 10 May at the Richard Herrod Centre in Carlton. Funded by Gedling Borough Council's share of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and delivered by the East Midlands Chamber, the event attracted numerous local business owners eager to collaborate and grow.

The interactive event allowed attendees to engage with council representatives and business experts, sharing challenges and exploring available support and funding. Practical exercises provided valuable insights into the specific needs of Gedling businesses, ensuring tailored future support.

One of the attendees was 'Dice and Balls', an independent community interest company based at Arnold Market Place. They sell board games, gaming equipment, and books by local authors, and also host parties, gaming conventions, and events. Owners Zoe and Phire attended the launch event and shared their positive experience. Phire said, "Our experience was good. We found it a great chance to network and share experiences

and ideas. We have already received a follow-up visit from one of the consultants who is keen to help us develop our business and brand."



Mental Health and Wellbeing Spotlight: Phoenix Farm Wellbeing Café: “The Friendliest of Churches”

In Gedling Borough, numerous community groups and services offer people a place to connect, converse, and share experiences. Among these, the Phoenix Farm Wellbeing Café in Gedling stands out with a welcoming environment where people can find support during challenging times.

For the past two years, this weekly gathering, overseen by Deacon Helen Snowball, has grown into a tight-knit community of both old and new friends. With its homemade food, fun activities, and warm atmosphere, the café aims to foster friendship, fellowship, and a sense of belonging.



Meet the Members:

Michael: Michael has been attending the Wellbeing Café for a year now. Initially recommended to join by a friend, Michael found companionship and support among his fellow attendees. The companionship he discovered not only helped rebuild his confidence but also provided a much-needed outlet to navigate recent mental health challenges.

“After a period of self-isolation during the Covid pandemic, my depression worsened and I found it increasingly difficult to leave the house,” Michael shares. “Joining this group has been life-changing. I’ve not only regained my confidence but also formed bonds that will last a lifetime.”

Anne: Another valued member is Anne, who was initially accompanied by her daughter to encourage social interaction. Now, Anne attends the café independently, relishing the opportunity to connect with her “Phoenix Farm family” over a cup of tea and endless conversation.



Jaqui, Carol, and Maureen: For Jaqui, Carol, and Maureen, the café is synonymous with relaxation and camaraderie. Their weekly sessions are filled with lively games of Rummikhub—a strategic number game that serves as a delightful start to the week.

“This is one of the friendliest groups I’ve ever been a part of,” Jaqui remarks. “It’s a place where we can unwind, connect, and simply enjoy each other’s company.”

In addition to human companionship, the café also welcomes furry, four-legged visitors, with Connor the Golden Retriever being a particular favourite among attendees.

Artist returns to see award-winning portrait

Local artist Grahame Wheatley visited the Civic Centre earlier this year, exactly 25 years after winning an award for his portrait of Calverton inventor William Lee.

Grahame Wheatley's portrait is housed here in the Civic Centre at Arnot Hill park and took the top prize in a competition celebrating the Quarter-centenary of William Lee's invention of the first handknitting stocking frame in 1589.

Wheatley chose to paint a self-portrait, representing Lee and his dismay at not gaining recognition for his invention from Queen Elizabeth I. Its importance was later recognised as the first step in the mechanisation of the textile industry and was the only one in use for centuries.

Gedling Borough Council sponsored the competition in 1989 of which Grahame Wheatley was the standout winner. The piece now sits proudly at the Civic Centre where the artist and painting were happily reunited this week.

Remembering his inspiration, Mr Wheatley said: "The portrait was painted in my bedroom using a single mirror next to the window to get side lighting. With the story of Lee in mind I depicted myself holding one of my socks and with a disgruntled look on my face expressing disappointment at not being granted a patent."

Arnot Hill Park

A beautiful, Green Flag Award winning park set in the leafy suburbs of Arnold, Nottingham. The park has a skate park, ball courts, rose garden and also a privately ran cafe on site.



Bestwood Country Park

650 acres of varied landscape, wildlife and industrial heritage. The park has become popular with walkers, cyclists and bird watchers as well as those coming to see Bestwood Winding Engine House.



Breck Hill Recreation Ground

A beautiful, Green Flag Award winning park set in the leafy suburbs of Woodthorpe.

The park has a recently refurbished play area, a pavilion newly decorated by a local graffiti artist, football pitches and a community Orchard. The park has recently become easily accessible for all with a newly built path and entrance.



Burton Road Jubilee Park

Burton Road Jubilee Park is a recreation ground in Carlton that offers a variety of facilities such as walking, gym equipment, children's play area, skate park, sports pitches and a nature trail. The terrain of the park makes it ideal for people with disabilities; there is a 1.2m wide footpath around the perimeter that reaches all the facilities.



Gedling Country Park

Gedling Country Park opened in 2015 and has 580 acres of open space, footpaths and wildlife, with stunning views over the surrounding areas.

The park has a popular children's play area, complete with a mining tower slide and zip wire, several picnic areas, two viewing platforms, a visitor centre where you can find out more about the history of the park and surrounding area and the fabulous Café 1899, offering hot and cold food and drinks.

inclusion, they have championed the values of democracy and civic engagement. They've worked with the police to tackle knife crime, started the Gedling Youth Mayor Initiative, and even had a say in how mental health services are run.

They also make sure young people's voices are heard in bigger conversations. In the 'Make Your Mark' campaign, they've had a big say in deciding what's important for young people across the country.
