Local Government Reorganisation

In December, the Government announced plans to introduce more powers for councils as part of a new Devolution White Paper. Their proposals include local government reorganisation, the creation of new unitary councils to replace the current two-tier system. This would mean that all nine councils in Nottinghamshire, including Nottingham City and district/borough councils would disappear, and new unitary councils would be created, but it is down to local agreement to determine what that will look like

The Government has not been clear if any changes will require consultation with the councils affected but we want to reassure residents and businesses that we will continue to carry out our business as usual. Whatever happens, our residents and businesses will still need the same quality services that they get now.

Now, more than ever, we need to focus on the job in hand and we have a lot to achieve in 2025 and this has not changed. We are very proud of the work we are doing to serve people and improve lives in Gedling and we must continue to focus on this work.

Leader's column

In December, the Government announced new plans to change how councils operate. The local government reorganisation aims to make councils more effective by dissolving two-tier councils and creating larger, unitary councils. These changes would mean dissolving Gedling Borough Council and merging it into a new, larger council. At the time of this magazine going to print, no decisions had been made about what that council might look like.

I have been meeting with leaders and the chief executives of all nine councils involved, and these meetings will continue to seek consensus on the best options for Nottinghamshire residents and businesses. The final submission to the Government is expected to be made in the autumn. We currently anticipate a response from the Government on these proposals around May next year.

We will ensure that residents, businesses, and council staff are kept informed about any decisions. For now, we must stay focused on delivering essential services for the people of Gedling.

In this magazine, we share some great examples of the good work taking place in our borough. You can read about the Pride of Gedling Award winners, where I had the honour of presenting a lifetime achievement award to Nat Puri.

Simpler Recycling for Businesses —

Are you ready?

From 31 March 2025, new government regulations will require businesses to separate plastic, paper and card, glass, metals (cans, tins and foil) and food waste from general waste. This change applies to all businesses and organisations that have over 10 employees and produce waste, including offices, shops, restaurants, and schools.

The regulations are part of a national push to reduce waste, increase recycling and protect the environment. They mean that food waste will need to be collected separately from other rubbish and recycling.

Here in Gedling, we're taking steps to help local businesses adapt. We're expanding our trade waste service to include the new collections, alongside general waste and recycling collections. This means businesses can use one supplier for all their waste needs, avoiding the hassle of multiple providers.

What does this mean for your business?

If you already use Gedling Borough Council's trade waste service, you can add the new recycling collections to your current agreement. This will help you meet the new rules quickly and easily.

If you're not a current customer, now is a good time to switch. Our service is straightforward, reliable and designed to help businesses comply with the regulations. New legislation by 31 March 2025

County Council Elections

The elections for Nottinghamshire County Council take place on Thursday 1 May and anyone registered to vote can do so at their nearest polling station.

County Councillors are responsible for making decisions about services run by

Nottinghamshire County Council which include education, social care and transport. There are currently 66 County Councillors who represent 56 areas across the County. There are 9 County Councillors responsible for 6 areas across the borough of Gedling.

How do I vote?

Every eligible person on the register will be sent a poll card about the election. The card will give information on where you need to go to cast your vote. Please read this carefully as some people's polling stations may have changed. Information on how to vote will be displayed in polling stations or you can ask the staff. If you cannot attend your polling station on Thursday 1 May, you can apply for a postal or proxy vote.

Postal and Proxy votes

If you are unable or do not want to vote in person at the election you can apply for a postal or proxy vote. If you have a postal vote, we will send ballot papers to your chosen address for you to complete and send back to us. A proxy vote is where you give somebody else permission to go to the polling station and vote on your behalf. Postal and proxy votes can apply for this election only or for all elections in the next 3 years. You must apply online at

www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote for a postal or www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote for a proxy. For security you will need to provide your date of birth and a signature. Information on paper application

forms is available at www.gedling.gov.uk/elections or you can call 0115 901 3917 to have a form sent to vou.

The deadline for us to receive applications is 5pm on Monday 14 April. Postal packs for existing postal voters or new applications received before 28 March will be posted out on 14 April – anything applied for after this date will be sent out around 21 April.

Voter ID

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at all elections in England. If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for

a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

Market move confirmed

Eagle Square has been made the permanent home of Arnold Market traders. This decision follows extensive consultations with the traders and is part of the longterm plan to improve Arnold town centre.

The market temporarily relocated to Eagle Square in 2022 and has become a visible and active gateway for the town. Feedback from traders, businesses and residents highlighted strong support for the move, with many recognising the benefits of keeping the market in this central location. Retailers and market traders were especially supportive, citing the market's potential to drive footfall and boost local trade.

A recent consultation gathered input from over 130 stakeholders, including shoppers, business owners, and traders. While public opinion was mixed, with 48% of residents in favour, 62% of businesses and all market traders supported the permanent relocation. Suggestions included more variety in market stalls,

regular deep cleaning of the area and introducing specialist markets such as farmers' or artisan events.

The market area has also seen significant investment with over £20,000 agreed for new canopies, alongside recent changes to the landscape of Eagle Square to make it more accessible, funded by the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

The council's broader Ambition Arnold Masterplan, which aims to revitalise the town centre, also prioritised enhancing the market offer. A benchmarking review showed Arnold's market days bring higher footfall compared to similar towns, underlining its importance to the local economy.













In February, some exciting new sensory elements were unveiled at The Garden for the Blind in Carlton Hill, as part of a development project supported by the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

This inclusive initiative aims to encourage wider use of the garden by the local community, shoppers, families and other visitors. The sensory garden is especially beneficial for blind and partially sighted people, children and anyone with sensory needs.

Additions to the garden include:

- Sensory planting with a wider variety of scents, colours and textures
 - Harmony bells as auditory elements to

- Tactile rubbing plaques

Although the garden was closed to the public for a few days for the ground works to be carried out, the separate play area next to the garden remained open during the project.

Councillors attended the unveiling event along with Dr Luke Hewitt and his family, a visually impaired local man who originally opened the sensory garden in July 1990. Luke's name has remained on the commemorative plaque, which has been replaced to restore the Braille, which had deteriorated over time.

It is hoped that the Garden for the Blind will be enjoyed by the local community and visitors for many years to come with its new sensory elements, furniture and plants.

Design code approved for borough

Gedling Borough Council has adopted a new Design Code Framework to guide good design for new residential developments. The framework, adopted in November 2024, sets out clear principles to ensure high-quality planning applications and must be used alongside other planning policies, such as the local plan and neighbourhood plans.

The Design Code addresses three themes; a Characterful Gedling, a Greener Gedling and a Connected and Healthy Gedling.

Proposals for new residential developments will be expected to reflect the character of the surrounding area and the Design Code includes specific design requirements that

'must' or 'should' be met, depending on the scale of development proposed.

Applications must include a completed checklist at the end of each Design Code document. This checklist explains how each principle has been addressed, supported by evidence. If an application does not meet a principle, applicants must provide clear justification or evidence. Non-compliance without justification may result in the application being refused.

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AMP office space opened

The AMP office space in Arnold is now ready to welcome businesses, offering modern facilities designed to help startups and small-to-medium enterprises thrive.

Gedling Borough Council has transformed the first floor of this flagship building into high-quality office spaces and a meeting room.

The redevelopment was funded by the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund, alongside council investment. The new facilities include parking, an EV charging point and a shower room, making sustainable travel easier for tenants. Businesses can rent these spaces on flexible terms, with competitive rates and the added benefit of being part of a vibrant business hub. The AMP's location, which also includes a Post Office, provides a central spot for collaboration and networking.

Since opening in 2022, The AMP has supported several small businesses on its ground floor. The completion of the first floor adds even more opportunities to boost local economic growth. This initiative aligns with Gedling Borough Council's priorities to revitalise town centres, increase footfall in Arnold's shopping precinct, and support the success of local businesses.

The AMP office space stands out for its sustainability features. It's designed to reduce energy use and carbon emissions, featuring 51 solar panels, natural ventilation points, high-efficiency LED lighting, and rainwater retention tanks. Its Energy Performance Rating of 'B' exceeds the average for commercial properties, reflecting the council's commitment to achieving carbon neutrality by 2030.

This development forms part of the council's broader regeneration plans for Arnold, which include purchasing vacant units and creating a masterplan to attract further investment.

Funding Update:

Improvements to local sports facilities

Significant progress has been made on several sports facility improvement projects in Gedling Borough, supported by funding from the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). These projects aim to enhance access to local sports facilities and provide more opportunities for residents to participate in sporting activities.

Here are the latest projects that have received funding:



Calverton Miners Welfare Football Club:

The new 3G pitch was funded with £100,000 plus £663,577 match funding from the Football Foundation. It is now complete and ready for use by teams and participants.




Arnold Leisure Centre:

Additional funding has been secured, bringing the total investment for plant room improvements to £35.386.



Conway Park Tennis Courts:

Renovation work began in January 2025. with a total project cost of £152,080. This includes £39,000 from Gedling Borough Council (secured through the UKSPF) and £112,935.17 from the Lawn Tennis Association.





Lambley Lane Recreation Ground:

New sports changing units have been installed, featuring solar panels and enhanced security measures.

These developments will support grassroots football and community programs run by clubs including Mapperley All Stars, who provide football coaching for children and adults. Total funding for project was from UKSPF £242,029 and the Football Foundation £91.279.

The networking events, delivered by East Midlands Chamber, are a popular way for local businesses to connect, share ideas and learn about practical and financial business support, available across Gedling Borough.

Each event has had an inspirational keynote speaker discussing a variety of current topics, including 'Smarter Selling', 'how Artificial Intelligence can be used in business' and 'how to do Champagne Marketing on a Lemonade budget'.

Feedback has been encouraging, suggesting that many businesses find the networking events beneficial in terms of gaining practical knowledge, building relationships with their peers and creating new opportunities for collaboration.

Following the January event, local business owners met with the organisers to discuss the future of

the network, preferred formats for the event and suggested topics they would like covered at future events.



His generosity doesn't end with education; Professor Puri has been instrumental in supporting key infrastructure projects in our borough, most recently, the installation of a new footpath at Breck Hill Park, which his foundation funded entirely.

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Selective licensing success



Gedling Borough Council has reintroduced its selective licensing scheme in Netherfield. following a successful five-year programme that made private rental homes safer and better to live in. The new scheme began on 5 January 2025 and will run until 4 January 2030.

The selective licensing scheme requires landlords to apply for licences for their rental properties and meet specific standards to ensure homes are well-managed and safe. Applications are now open and can be completed online through the council's website.

The previous scheme, which ran from 2018 to 2023, proved highly effective. During that time, 662 landlords applied for licences, and over 81% of inspected properties were found to have hazards that needed addressing.

Selective licensing applies to areas with challenges such as deprivation, poor housing conditions, or high levels of crime and anti-social behaviour. It gives the council's Environmental Health team stronger powers to address these issues when landlords fail to act.

Ambition Arnold masterplan approved

The council has approved the Ambition Arnold Visionary Masterplan report, a strategic framework designed to revitalise Arnold town centre and address its long-term sustainability. Cabinet members met in December to discuss and approve the item. The report follows extensive public consultation, which revealed strong support for improvements across key areas.

The consultation, held in summer 2024, gathered feedback from over 650 residents and stakeholders. Findings showed clear backing for measures to improve the town's appearance, diversify its shops, enhance safety and create more appealing public spaces. Residents highlighted priorities including reducing vacant shops, tackling antisocial behaviour and providing better facilities for pedestrians and young people.

Key features of the masterplan include:

- Upgrading leisure, cultural and retail offerings to attract more visitors.
- Enhancing public spaces, shopfronts and access to green areas.
- Developing a car parking strategy and safeguarding public transport links.
- Exploring a modern library facility and better access to council and healthcare services.

The plan also responds to an independent benchmarking review, which compared Arnold to similar towns nationwide. While Arnold benefits from strong transport links and above-average footfall, challenges include vacant shops, limited market stalls and concerns about anti-social behaviour.

The delivery of the masterplan is subject to significant funding, either from government, private investors or a combination of the two.





Strength training has many health benefits, including helping to build bone density, increase muscle mass and improve balance, helping to reduce the risk of injury and falls. This type of exercise is ideal to do alongside regular cardio exercises like going for a brisk walk, swimming or dancing.

Women of all fitness abilities, who are looking for a new way to get active with the support of others, in a safe environment, are welcome to join the classes at the Gedling Leisure Centres and to sign up to the Her Spirit app.





Where does your waste go?

Ever wondered where your waste goes after it's collected? In Gedling Borough, we manage household waste collection, while Nottinghamshire County Council handles recycling, treatment and disposal.



Recyclable Waste

Your recyclables
(paper, card, cans and
plastic bottles) are
taken to the Mansfield
Materials Recovery
Facility. Here they're
sorted and sent to
reprocessors in the
UK and abroad to
be made into new
products.

Non-recyclable Waste

Non-recyclable waste from Gedling is transported to the Eastcroft Energy from Waste Facility in Nottingham. There it's incinerated to generate energy, with the heat contributing to the city's district heating scheme.

Bulky Waste

For large household items, we offer a collection service. Items like fridges, sofas and bedframes can be collected for a fee. You can book a bulky waste at any time online or by calling the council.

What you can do

Proper waste separation is crucial. Place recyclables in the correct bins to ensure they can be processed efficiently. Avoid putting recyclables in your general waste bin, as they won't be recycled.

By understanding where your waste goes and following these guidelines, you contribute to a more sustainable Gedling Borough.

Flytipping

Flytipping is a blight on our community and we have taken several measures to reduce it happening, however, residents may not be aware that they have a responsibility to ensure they dispose of waste correctly and use a registered waste provider. Failure to do so could result in them being prosecuted, even if they didn't dump the fly tip, residents have a duty of care to ensure they use a registered provider.

How to get rid of your waste?

If you have large items that can not go in your normal bins, there are several ways that you can dispose of them:

If it's a large item, we offer a bulky waste disposal service, prices start from £22 and we can collect up to three large items such as sofas, fridge freezers and from your doorstep.

You can also dispose of many common waste items at Nottinghamshire County Council's Calverton Recycling Centre, but you need to register your vehicle. Visit

Country park car parking charges

Gedling Borough Council Cabinet members have approved plans to introduce car parking charges at Gedling Country Park. Members also confirmed that all revenue generated from the new parking charges will be reinvested directly into the maintenance, upkeep and development of the award-winning park.

Cabinet members discussed the plans at their meeting on 9 January, following a public consultation. The feedback received has helped shape the plan, which includes the introduction of a £2 daily parking fee from 1 April 2025, and a permit for regular visitors, as well as passes for members and volunteers of the Friends of Gedling Country Park group and park run volunteers.

Blue badge holders will have three hours of free parking.

Cashless payment options will be available as an additional convenience for users, but you will also be able to pay with cash.

Across the borough people will be able to pay using a mobile app or card at selected machines, but cash payments will continue to be accepted across all car parks.

The parking charge is expected to generate up to £200,000 annually, which will be used exclusively to ensure the park remains one of Nottinghamshire's best-loved green spaces. Funds will go towards essential maintenance, such as repairing potholes in the upper car park, and broader park improvements to benefit the community and visitors.

Youth Mayor
