New Chair appointed to lead £20 million Carlton investment plan

Gedling Borough Council has announced the appointment of David Stewart OBE as the new Independent Chair of the Greater Carlton Neighbourhood Board, the group overseeing the delivery of £20 million in government funding to improve Carlton and surrounding areas.

Mr Stewart brings over five decades of experience in education, community leadership and youth engagement. A former Head Teacher at Oak Field School for 27 years, Mr Stewart has also served as a school governor, university lecturer and charity trustee. His work across mainstream and special education, combined with strong ties to local institutions, brings vital insight into the needs of the community.

He replaces Sir John Peace, who served as the

interim chair during the board's early stages. The board will now continue its work to develop a 10-year Regeneration Plan to help shape a better future for Carlton and its surrounding areas.

The Greater Carlton Neighbourhood Board is part of the government's Plan for Neighbourhoods, which is investing £1.5 billion across 75 areas, over the next decade. Carlton is one of the areas selected to receive a £20 million share of this investment, aimed at "fixing the foundations" in places that have previously been left behind.

Board members include local community leaders, business representatives, and elected officials, including the Member of Parliament for Gedling, Michael Payne, and Leader of Gedling Borough Council, Councillor John Clarke MBE.

UK Shared Prosperity Funding in Gedling

Between 2022-2025, Gedling Borough Council received £2.87 million from the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund to support local people, places and businesses. Below is a summary of how the funding was used.

Our communities

The funding helped to improve streets, parks and public spaces. Over 80,000 sqm of public areas and 18,000 sqm of green space were upgraded. Events such as festivals, art projects and heritage activities brought communities together. New and upgraded CCTV cameras have helped to improve the safety of residents. Grants supported 69 local groups offering services such as food, mental health support and social activities.

Supporting local businesses

More than 300 local businesses received help through advice, training and grants. Projects supported new and growing businesses, helping to create 14 jobs

Funded by UK Government and start 7 new businesses. The AMP and Hill Crest Business Park added over 800 sqm of workspaces. Energy-saving grants helped companies cut costs and go greener.

Investing in people's futures

Hundreds of people received help to find work and improve their skills, including training in IT, life skills or English. HGV and forklift training opened up new job opportunities and the 'Transform Your Future' programme supported over 100 people to build confidence and find work.

This funding has had a positive impact on Gedling by improving places, helping businesses grow and giving people the tools they need to succeed. It has built stronger communities and helped create a brighter future for the borough.





Gedling Borough marks 80 years since VE Day

Gedling Borough Council proudly commemorated the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day with a poignant ceremony at Arnot Hill Park on Wednesday 8 May. The event, held outside the Civic Centre, brought together councillors, service personnel and community representatives to reflect on this historic milestone.

The ceremony began with a speech from Leader of the Council, Councillor John Clarke MBE, who reflected on the courage and sacrifice of those who served during the Second World War and the enduring importance of peace. A reading followed by Father Philipp Ziomek offered a moment of contemplation, before Lieutenant Jean Pardoe OBE delivered a moving address and raised the Union Flag.

To mark the anniversary in a lasting way, a tree was planted in Arnot Hill Park. An Acer Campestre 'Red Shine' tree was chosen for its symbolic value representing remembrance, resilience and hope for future generations.

On 1 May a local election was held for Nottinghamshire County Council. In the borough of Gedling, we had a turnout of 34.21%, with 31,449 votes cast from a possible electorate of 91,919.

New units are ready for business

Work has now been completed on the construction of four new industrial units at Hill Crest Business Park in Calverton.

The Lindum Group carried out the work in partnership with Gedling Borough Council and built environment consultancy firm, Gleeds.

The new units expand the number of business units <u>on the site from eight to twelve</u>. They have been



tailored to meet the needs of local small and medium-sized enterprises and will help to meet the growing demand for space at the business park, as well as creating spaces for businesses to thrive and offer employment opportunities. Deputy Leader, Cllr Jenny Hollingsworth at the new units

The new premises have been designed to blend in with neighbouring facilities and fit seamlessly into the existing site. The eco-friendly facilities include 194 square metres of photovoltaic panels, low energy lighting, EV charging and a new planting scheme, to help boost the area's green credentials in alignment with the council's Carbon Management Strategy, which aims to achieve net-zero emissions by 2030.

The total cost of $\pounds1,430,000$ has been supported by D2N2 LEP with $\pounds642k$ grant funding, alongside $\pounds146K$ from the UK Government Shared Prosperity Fund and further capital funding by the council.

Mosaic celebrates the history of Netherfield

A

A community art project, supported by the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Funding (UKSPF), has been completed. The mosaic mural, installed to welcome visitors to the area was unveiled in Jackie Bells Park, Netherfield.

The mosaic was designed by artist, Anna Dixon, who worked with local residents to create a mural that reflects the key themes, memories and locations they associate with the area, which has a rich railway heritage. Once a thriving railway town, Netherfield was home to the largest freight concentration yard in Europe, built by the Great Northern Railway in 1875. The yard was used to gather coal traffic from the Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire coalfields and dispatch it to London. Anna held workshops at Netherfield Primary School to teach school children how to make the mosaic. The artist also led making sessions with local youth groups and several adult workshop

several adult workshops were held at St. Georges Centre and the Loco Centre in Netherfield for residents from Gedling borough to get involved in making the colourful mosaic.

Netherfield Ward Councillor Alison Hunt has been closely involved with the project, to engage the local community and is also supporting the Friends of Jackie Bell's Field working group.

Netherfield will also receive other improvements including new tree planting, new railings and bins. The local initiative aims to encourage more visitors to the park and local shops.

Work starts on new homes at Top Wighay

Councillor Jenny Hollingsworth, Deputy Leader of Gedling Borough Council, joined Nottinghamshire County Councillors and members of the Vistry Group, to celebrate the start of work on 763 new homes at Top Wighay, triggering the start of a £6 million investment to bolster local services.

Situated approximately 2km north of Hucknall town centre, the £191m development is an 86-acre site which will also include 21 acres of employment land and a local centre with retail offering.

269 of the new homes will be affordable properties, 97 will be available for private rental and 397 will be sold on the open market. In addition to new housing, the development will also offer benefits to the wider community, with almost \pounds 6million designated to bolstering local services. This includes £4,750,000 for education, £800,000 for highways and bus improvements and £436,000 towards healthcare.

The scheme also includes new parks, sports facilities, wildlife corridors, pedestrian and cycle routes, a new primary school and an on-site Skills Academy in partnership with Chameleon School of Construction. This innovative training initiative will aim to encourage local people not in employment or training back into work.

Planning for the future of Gedling

Gedling Borough Council is delivering a number of projects that are helping to shape the future of the borough. These projects aim to protect the borough's heritage, enhance the look and feel of our high streets and public spaces and plan for the future needs of our communities.

A new Local Plan for Gedling Borough

Work has begun on a new Local Plan, which will guide how the borough develops. This follows recent changes to national planning policy and will help us manage future growth in a way that benefits residents and supports local prosperity.

The Local Plan will identify key issues and set out options for how much new development, including housing and employment, is needed and where it should go.

From late July, we'll be asking for your views on an Issues and Options document, including a range of topics from housing and jobs to the environment and infrastructure. Your feedback will help shape the next stage of the plan. Once adopted, the Local Plan will guide how planning applications are decided, alongside other local and national policies.

National Empty Homes Week

As part of this year's National Empty Homes Week, Gedling Borough Council highlighted the vital work it does to bring long-term empty properties back into use. With a dedicated Empty Homes Officer, the council is committed to tackling the issue of vacant homes and ensuring they contribute to the local housing supply.

A long-term empty property is defined as one that has been unoccupied for six months or more. While some of these properties may appear derelict, many look lived-in and well-maintained, making it crucial for residents to report any suspected empty homes. The Empty Homes Officer can then investigate and work with property owners to find solutions.

Gedling Borough has a long-term vacancy rate of 0.79%, which is below both the East Midlands average of 1.1% and the national rate of 1.03%. Total vacancy in the borough is currently 1,652 properties, equivalent to 3.3% of all homes, which is lower than the national average of 3.9%. The council actively monitors these figures and works to bring as many empty homes as possible back into use.

There are many reasons why properties remain empty, including sentimental attachment, probate issues,

financial difficulties, or waiting to pass the home on to a beneficiary. The council works directly with homeowners to provide practical solutions, including:

- Property Matchmaker Scheme

 connecting empty
 homeowners with investors who
 can purchase or lease properties
 for refurbishment.
- Property Consultants expert advice and bespoke solutions to help owners sell or renovate their homes.
- Lendology Loans low-interest loans for owners of empty homes struggling financially to refurbish their properties.

In 2023/2024, the council successfully brought 114 empty properties back into use, with some homes having been vacant for more than 26 years. That number continues to increase with the hard work of the council's dedicated Empty Homes Officer. When homeowners are unwilling to engage, the council has legal tools at its disposal, including Compulsory Purchase Orders, Empty Dwelling Management Orders, and Enforced Sales.

Newly refurbished playground opens to local families,

Valley Road Playground in Carlton, has reopened, following the completion of a major transformation, made possible by a $\pm 100,000$ grant from FCC Communities Foundation.

The new-look playground features an exciting range of equipment including a 30-metre zip line, swings, monkey bars and a wheelchair-accessible seesaw. It also boasts two DDA-compliant trampolines (meaning that people with disabilities can use them), a basket swing and interactive play panels, ensuring the space is accessible for children of all abilities.

To celebrate the reopening, local families, members of the Friends of Valley Road Playing Field group and representatives from FCC Communities Foundation gathered at the park to try out the new facilities and mark the occasion.

Outgoing Mayor of Gedling, Councillor Ron McCrossen, who officially opened the play area, said: "This park has always been popular with families, and thanks to the funding from FCC Communities Foundation and the dedication of the Friends of Valley Road, it's now better than ever. It's great to see such an inclusive space where children of all ages and abilities can play together and enjoy being outdoors."

Marie Spinks, Chair of the Friends of Valley Road Playing Field, said: "This has been a real community effort and we're incredibly proud of what we've achieved. We're so grateful to everyone who supported the project – this new space will be a real asset to local families for many years to come."

Penny Horne, FCC Communities Foundation Grant Manager, added: "It's fantastic to see the transformation of Valley Road Playground now complete. The new equipment is not only fun but inclusive, and we're proud to have played a role in creating a space that brings people together and promotes active outdoor play for everyone."

The project has been delivered in partnership with Gedling Borough Council, the Friends of Valley Road Playing Field, FCC Communities Foundation and Nottinghamshire County Council.





Carlton Leisure and Wellbeing Community Centre

A vision for the future

Plans are taking shape for a brand-new Carlton Leisure and Wellbeing Community Centre - a modern, inclusive facility to replace the existing Carlton Forum Leisure Centre and Richard Herrod Centre.

The new building won't just be a leisure centre. The vision is to create a vibrant hub where people can stay active, connect with others and access health and wellbeing support - all in one welcoming space in the heart of Carlton.

Over the last few months, hundreds of residents, local groups and organisations have taken part in surveys, focus groups, drop-in sessions and community workshops to help shape what the centre should offer. Feedback from the consultation will directly inform the facility mix, design and services that the centre will offer - ensuring it reflects the needs and aspirations of the local community.

Initial plans include swimming pools, a gym, group exercise studios, multi-use community rooms and a cafe. The council is also exploring the opportunity to house health and wellbeing services within the centre - creating a one-stop destination for the community.

Sustainability will be a key part of the design, with the building planned to meet high environmental standards and deliver lower energy costs.

Construction of the new hub could begin in 2026, subject to funding and approvals.

Update on Local Government Reorganisation Plans

Earlier this year, Nottinghamshire's nine local councils – including Gedling Borough Council – took a step forward in discussions about Local Government Reorganisation (LGR), following an invitation from Government to consider creating new unitary authorities.

At a meeting of council leaders and chief executives on 5 March, the councils reaffirmed their commitment to working together on a collective response that would ensure the best possible outcomes for residents and businesses across the county.

Between 17 and 20 March, each council held a Full Council meeting to consider an interim submission to Government, ahead of the 21 March deadline. This submission outlined three potential options for reorganising local government in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire.

Under the Government's proposals, the current two-tier structure – with county and district/borough councils – could be replaced with unitary authorities responsible for all local services. The goal is to improve efficiency and reduce duplication.

The three core options that were tabled included:

- A new unitary authority combining Nottingham, Broxtowe, and Gedling, with another authority covering the remaining districts.
- A similar option, but with Rushcliffe replacing Gedling in the first grouping.

 Nottingham remaining a standalone unitary authority, with a new single unitary for the rest of Nottinghamshire.

No final decisions were made at this stage. The March submission was an early step in a longer process, with councils agreeing to carry out further analysis and community engagement before submitting detailed proposals by the Government's deadline of 28 November.

While some councils may continue exploring alternative proposals, the overall aim remains to ensure any new structure delivers better services and outcomes for local people. Leaders also recognised that changes to current boundaries may need to be considered as part of this process.

Gedling Borough Council remains committed to ensuring that any future decisions put the needs of its residents first.



Illegal fly-tipping prosecution

Gedling Borough Council is urging residents to remain vigilant and report fly-tipping after securing a conviction against an individual who failed to meet their legal responsibilities when disposing of waste. The case supports the council's zero-tolerance approach to environmental crime and its commitment to ensuring neighbourhoods remain safe and clean for all.

A Nottinghamshire-based man has pleaded guilty at Nottingham Magistrates' Court to failing in their duty of care regarding the disposal of controlled waste. They were fined £500 and ordered to pay £200 towards prosecution costs.

The case followed a report of fly-tipping in a secluded area of Ravenshead in March 2024. Gedling Borough Council Neighbourhood Wardens investigated and were able to trace a large quantity of dumped waste, including household rubbish, tyres and furniture, back to its source. Enquiries revealed that a local resident had paid a small sum to have the waste removed by someone advertising gardening and waste removal



services online. They had claimed to be a licensed waste carrier, but further investigation found this was not the case. Despite repeated attempts to engage with them, the offender failed to cooperate with the council's Public Protection team, which ultimately led to legal action and their arrest.

Fly-tipping is a serious offence that harms the environment, endangers wildlife, and places a financial burden on local taxpayers due to the cost of clean-up operations. The council is encouraging all residents to check that anyone they pay to remove waste holds a valid waste carriers' licence and to report any fly-tipping incidents via the council's website.

New trees and wildflower meadow at Digby Park

A major tree planting project at Digby Park, Mapperley, has now been completed, marking another step forward in Gedling Borough Council's commitment to enhancing green spaces and tackling climate change.

The latest phase of the project has seen over 1,200 new trees planted at the site, supported by Defra with a grant through the Trees for Climate grant, administered by Nottinghamshire County Council's Greenwood Community Forest. The grant, totalling £34,416, also covers ongoing maintenance to ensure the long-term health of the newly planted trees.

In addition to the tree planting, the project will also see the creation of a wildflower meadow. The meadow will provide vital habitat for pollinators and other wildlife, further enhancing biodiversity within the park.

This initiative builds on the original tree trail, launched during National Tree Week, which saw over 500 trees planted and new park features introduced, including benches, improved drainage, and QR-coded plaques providing information about different tree species.

The expansion of tree planting at Digby Park aligns with Gedling Borough Council's wider Carbon Management Strategy, which aims to reduce the borough's carbon footprint and take action in the fight against climate change. It also contributes to the Government's broader environmental goals, including the target of reaching net-zero emissions by 2050. Trees play a key role in this strategy, with DEFRA working towards the Environmental Act's target of halting nature's decline by 2030 and increasing tree canopy cover in England to 16.5% by 2050.

The Trees for Climate grant is funded through DEFRA'S Nature for Climate Fund, which supports large-scale tree planting projects to help meet these ambitious environmental goals.

New 3G football pitch

Councillor Henry Wheeler on the new 3G pitch



Funded by UK Government

A brand-new. all-weather 3G football pitch at Calverton Miners Welfare Football Club is now complete and ready for use, thanks to support from Gedling Borough Council and funding from the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

The state-of-the-art facility, based at the club's grounds in Calverton, features a high-guality artificial surface and newly installed floodlights, enabling matches, training sessions and community events to take place all year round, including during the darker evening hours.

The project was partfunded by a £100,000 contribution from Gedling Borough Council, with additional match funding helping to unlock further investment from the Football Foundation. bringing the total value of the project to over £500,000.

The upgraded pitch is already supporting the club's growing number of vouth and adult teams. It is regularly used for training, coaching sessions and community events, with a particular focus on providing quality facilities for junior football development and encouraging more young people to get active and involved in sport.

This investment is one of several initiatives being delivered across the borough to improve sports participation, support grassroots clubs, and create a healthier, more active community.

The LAEP will create a detailed strategy to reduce carbon emissions and boost energy efficiency. Using cutting-edge digital twin technology, the project will simulate and monitor the energy performance of buildings, ensuring we use energy wisely and efficiently.

Some of the key focus areas for the plan will include finding the best spots for heat pumps to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels and improving building insulation to save energy and cut costs.

This project isn't just about the environment—it is about our community! By attracting investment in green technologies, the LAEP will create jobs, support local businesses, and stimulate economic growth.



The LAEP for Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire was approved by the East Midlands Combined County Authority in August 2024 and is expected to be one of the largest of its kind in England running in Gedling until July 2025.

The work is part of the council's ambitious plans to become carbon net zero by 2030.

Gedling Country Park turns 10

Gedling Country Park opened in 2015 and celebrates its 10th anniversary this year. The award-winning 276-acre park is built on the site of Gedling Collieryand celebrates the mining heritage of the area.

Work began to create a new country park in February 2014, including building the play areas and a visitor centre, which houses Café 1899, named after the colliery's opening year. Extensive landscaping and tree planting has taken place during the last 10 years, to create a variety of wildlife habitats and several trails and gardens for visitors to enjoy. There are also two viewing platforms offering views as far as Belvoir Castle.

The park has been awarded Green Flag status every year since it opened. In recent years the park has hosted events including the beacon lighting for HM Queen Elizabeth II's Jubilee and Peace in the Park, as well as being part of the Queen's Green Canopy national tree planting scheme.

How to safely dispose of batteries and electronics

Batteries and electrical items should not be put into kerbside bins as they can cause fires in our waste collection lorries.

We can collect used batteries (not including car or commercial batteries) and small electrical items (the size of a toaster or laptop) from your home. Put your batteries in a bag and any small electrical items in a separate untied bag and place them on top of your black or green bin on collection day and we will take them away.

Larger electrical items will need to be disposed of at the Calverton Household Waste Recycling Centre, Hollinwood Lane, NG14 6NR. You can also book a bulky waste collection by visiting www.gedling.gov.uk/bulkywaste.
