# **Build a career**

We're working with local developers to provide training, work experience and jobs for residents through the use of Local Labour Agreements (LLA's).

Part of the planning process for new developments including housing, schools and highways require an LLA in order to support the local community by providing local employment and training opportunities. This includes offering work experience, jobs and guidance in secondary schools to promote careers in construction.

The LLA put in place at the Chase Farm development in Gedling has already helped to provide training and apprenticeship opportunities for residents as well as direct employment.

We've also been working with a number of secondary schools in the borough through our Employability Scheme. Last year we supported over 1,800 students, offering speed networking, have a go workshops and interview skills days.

# A license to improve homes in Netherfield

From October, new powers to make privately rented homes better for people to live in came into force in Netherfield. We introduced a Selective Licensing scheme which makes it mandatory for landlords to have licenses for each of their privately rented properties in the Netherfield area.

The license requires that the landlord provides minimum standards of accommodation for residents. We are working with landlords and residents to improve the area but, where necessary, we will be able to use the licensing conditions and enforcement powers to bring about improvements.

The scheme, which is being piloted in Netherfield at the moment, can apply in areas where there is deprivation, antisocial behaviour, high levels of crime and poor housing conditions. The licensing will give the council's Environmental Health team powers to do more when landlords are not taking steps to deal with issues relating to properties.

### Haywood Road Park improvements

A public space saved from closure will now be turned into a play area.

A new park and play area on Haywood Road, Mapperley will be built thanks to £120,000 of funding - £70,000 from WREN and £50,000 from the council. Plans for the park were approved in September and they include a rope pyramid, seesaws, slide, roundabout, balance beams and swings, picnic tables, benches and a table tennis area.

The Haywood Road Community Association made the joint bid with the council for £70,000 of funding from WREN, a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community, conservation and heritage projects.

Haywood Road Community Centre and its bowling green, which was proposed to be sold to housing developers last year, was saved by the council after listening to the concerns of hundreds of residents about its potential closure.

The park is expected to be ready by Easter 2019.





# A ticket to shine

More than 20 young people in Gedling have benefitted from 75 hours of free youth theatres over the last 12 months, thanks to funding from us and Gedling Homes.

A £10,000 joint grant to Nottingham Playhouse's SHINE youth theatres and 50:50 ticket programme has enabled youngsters from low income families in the area, learn new skills and build confidence at its Netherfield and Newstead youth theatres. The grant also covered the cost of 100 theatre tickets for Gedling Homes tenants who would otherwise not have the means to attend and enjoy the theatre.

SHINE community youth theatres were set up in 2015 and are run across Nottinghamshire, including in our borough in Netherfield and Newstead.

Nottingham Playhouse's 50:50 appeal raises money to donate tickets to local charities, community groups and schools.

### A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE

A new heritage trail has been installed at Gedling Country Park.

The 1.4km trail features eight 3ft wooden sculptures of the wildlife found across Gedling Country Park - a heron, badger, hedgehog, fox, rabbit, mole, bat and a green woodpecker. Each carving has information signs with facts about each animal, set at wheelchair friendly height, and interactive 'rubbing plaques' where children, using crayons, can follow the trail and create animal impressions in their booklets, which are available from the park's Café 1899.

The trail follows the 'High Hazels' accessible footpath, which is a 1.4km (0.87miles) wheelchair and pushchair friendly circular route.

The Friends of Gedling Country Park and Gedling Borough Council jointly commissioned the trail, which was part funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF), which is money generated by players of the National Lottery. The trail is part of a wider £74,000 HLF grant to explore and celebrate Gedling's heritage. In addition, the trail has received financial support from Co-op Gedling's community fund.

Four remembrance Tommy Soldiers figures have been unveiled at Gedling Country Park as a tribute to men and women who died during WWI.

The unveiling is part of Gedling Borough Council's programme of events to commemorate the 100 year anniversary of the end of the war. The metal silhouette figures of WWI soldiers, known as Tommies, were installed at four points around the park.

The Tommies are the brainchild of the There But Not There Campaign, an organisation who are supporting a number of Armed Forces charities by making the soldiers to raise money. The soldiers, which stand six foot tall, have been made by Army veterans, employed by Royal British Legion Industries.

The Tommies are permanently installed at the park and visitors will be able to see them at the entrance to the park, next to Café 1899 and in the memorial garden.

## **On top for least complaints**

This year we had the lowest number of complaints made to the Local Ombudsman, of all the local authorities in Nottinghamshire, with eight, of which none were upheld.

The figures were released by the Local Government and Social Care Ombudsman. who independently investigates complaints made against councils.

We recently introduced a more thorough process to analyse the root problem of complaints and to better understand the issues affecting our residents.

In total, there were 302 complaints made to the ombudsman about the eight local councils in Nottinghamshire during the last financial year.

# Local plan approved

We've published a plan which will shape the future development of the borough until 2028. The Local Planning Document, also known as the Local Plan, is a 200 page document that includes details of proposed sites to accommodate 7,250 new homes around the borough, to be built over the next 10 years.

The plan contains 71 policies covering a wide range of issues such as climate change, flood risk and water management, environmental protection, retail and community facilities, protecting garden land and transport.

Over half of the allocated 7,250 new homes have already been built or granted planning permission. The plan maximises the development on brownfield sites and minimises the release of green belt, with over 75% of the housing provision within or next to urban areas. The plan also sets out a strategy for improved sustainable development that recognises the need



for regeneration in areas where brownfield sites are available such as on the former Gedling Colliery and Chase Farm where 1,050 houses have been allocated.

The Local Plan also protects land from development. It will ensure there is a five year supply of land which will help reduce proposals for development in inappropriate locations. The site selection process for allocating land for development has taken into account the impact on heritage and landscape and protects those areas from development.

A minimum of 7,250 homes will be provided for during the plan period (2011- 2028).



# A snappy title

Gedling Country Park is set to be declared as a Local Nature Reserve to reflect the work being done to protect the wildlife and natural habitat on the former colliery site.

The Local Nature Reserve status is given to parks by Natural England, a public body set up to help protect nature and landscapes for people to enjoy.

The awarding of the status will be the icing on the cake for the work done by the council and the Friends of Gedling Country Park to turn the former colliery site into one of the best country parks in the region thanks to its unique landscapes, natural habitat and wildlife.

The status will increase public awareness of the importance of conservation of the park and will potentially improve the amount of funding for the upkeep of the park from funding providers such as Heritage Lottery Fund, WREN and DEFRA.

# Burial fees for children scrapped

We have approved plans to remove burial fees for all children under 18.

The plans were approved by Cabinet members in October and it means that no cost will be charged against residents who are arranging the burial of a child under the age of 18.

The increase in the exemption from paying a burial fee aims to help reduce the burden of a sudden and unexpected cost to families trying to cope with the tragedy of losing a child.

# Eagle Square renovation

Eagle Square in Arnold has been renovated as part of our ongoing plans to improve Arnold Town Centre.

We've removed the old large brick planters, installed new lighting and trees as well as a new circular seating area which can be removed for events. The new open space design provides a great place for shoppers to enjoy a break and the new level flooring means the area is more accessible for everyone.

A consultation took place earlier in the year and over 340 residents and businesses had their say on the plans, which helped shape the final design.

We already have big plans for the space, the first of which will be the hosting of the Arnold Christmas Market on the 23 and 24 November. Last year's event saw thousands of people attend and the extra space created at Eagle Square will mean the event can be bigger and better than before.

The renovation works were the second recent major investment for Arnold Town Centre, following our announcement back in May that we had purchased Arnold Market.

# Tackling knife crime



# Knife amnesty success

In September, we took part in a Knife Amnesty week, organised by Nottinghamshire Police. The aim of the amnesty was to encourage the disposal of unwanted knives, as part of the national crime campaign, Operation Sceptre.

Along with police stations and partner agencies, we had a knife amnesty bin in our Civic Centre during the week and we had over 50 knives handed in. In total, 418 knives were handed in during the amnesty, a 50% increase on the last campaign and 53 small knives were handed in at the civic centre, the second highest number collected in Nottinghamshire.

# CCTV installed in Arnold

New CCTV cameras have been installed in Arnold in response to two incidents of knife crime in the area. We are working with the Police on a number of initiatives, which included installing cameras on the footpath between Front Street and Smithy Crescent.

Our wardens have also been given new powers to help reduce anti-social behaviour and the Police now have a permanent space at our offices, so our wardens are able to work even closer with them to reduce crime in the borough. We are also supporting the Police with workshops for young people to educate them on the serious issues and consequences that can happen if they carry a knife. Local bikers dressed as Santa will be hitting the roads of Gedling to deliver toys for underprivileged children this Christmas when the 10th annual Toy Run takes place on Saturday 8 December.

**Toy run fun!** 

Toys are collected by the group of bikers, who then ride through the Arnold, Daybrook, Woodthorpe and Mapperley areas before stopping at The Arrow pub. The gifts are then handed out by the Salvation Army to young children in the area. There will also be prizes, donated by CMC Bikes and the Arrow Pub, for the best dressed Santa bikes, judged by the Mayor of Gedling. The event starts at 11am at The Arrow pub on Gedling Road, Arnold followed by a bike procession at 12pm.

### Pet cremation service

We have announced plans to introduce a pet cremation service for residents in the borough.

The plans were approved by Councillors after it was found that there were no services of this nature available locally and many people were going to great lengths to have their pets cremated outside of the area.

As part of the service, we will collect pets from a vet or directly from homes. The service will include providing a time for cremation within 48 hours and, if required, the return of the pet's ashes to their homes quickly and in a respectful manner, reducing the stress the loss of a pet can have on families.

The new service will begin in spring 2019 and more details will be available in the next edition of Contacts.

There are lots of options available including self care, your local pharmacy, GP services and the Urgent Care Centre on London Road in Nottingham. If you're unsure about where to go, call NHS 111.

Gedling GP, and Nottingham North and East Clinical Commissioning Group's clinical lead, Dr James Hopkinson says:

"Often people needing medical help go straight to A&E when there may be another more appropriate service available.

"People tend to get better advice and faster treatment when they need it if they choose the right NHS service for their symptoms or illness, so I'd ask them to consider carefully before going straight to A&E."

# Why talking therapies could be for you

The festive season is fast approaching and while for most people Christmas is a time to celebrate and have fun with the family, for some it can be a very lonely time. Christmas can be especially challenging if you're suffering from a mental health issue like anxiety, stress or depression.

If you're feeling low this festive season then talking therapies might help. If you are 18 and over and registered with a Gedling GP, you can either speak to your GP and they will refer you to a talking therapy service, or you can refer yourself.

#### Local GPs urge patients to self care for minor ailments

We're urging patients to self-care when they are suffering with minor ailments. Rather than visiting their GP, most people can take care of themselves when they have a minor illness through a combination of self care, pharmacy advice and over the counter medicines, which can be bought in supermarkets, shops or pharmacies.

Over the counter medicines for short term illnesses such as a cold. coughs and sore throats are no longer recommended on prescription.

To see a full guide to conditions where treatments are no longer available on prescription, please go to: www. nottinghamnortheastccg.nhs.uk/ nhs/otc-18. There are a number of exceptions, including if you are living with a long term condition. Details are also on the website.

If at any time you are concerned about your condition, or if your symptoms are not improving after a few days of treatment with the over the counter medications, you should contact the local pharmacist or your GP for more advice.
