£100k funding for Arnold play park

A popular play area in Arnold will have a £100,000 refurbishment and extension thanks to external funding.

The Muirfield Road Recreation
Ground in Arnold will be improved
thanks to funding from FCC
Communities Foundation Ltd, a
not-for-profit business that awards
grants for community, conservation
and heritage projects. The funding
bid was made jointly by Gedling
Borough Council and the Warren
Action Group, a local residents
group.

FCC Communities Foundation Ltd will be providing a grant total of £89,250 and the Warren Action Group will providing the required match funding of £10,750 making a total of £100,000.

The group have been working to revitalise the playground area and previously received £48,000 from WREN for a multi-use games area which was opened in 2017.

Gedling heritage launch

The Gedling Borough's "Heritage Brought Alive Project" was launched at Café 1899 in March. The event included the launch of a new heritage book, the unveiling of mosaics, a mural and a short film that will bring to life the borough's historic places, people and industries.

Two large mosaics, each made up of around 10,000 1cm square tiles, showing the past heritage of the area and how it is today, were unveiled by the Mayor of Gedling. The mosaics were designed by artist Peter Massey and put together with the help of children from Stanhope Primary School.

The event also included the launch of a new 80 page book written by volunteers and compiled and edited by Dr Stephen Walker, which is the first ever publication to talk about the heritage of the whole borough. The project, made possible thanks to a £74,900 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund and the work of volunteers over the last 15 months, is part of the council's heritage strategy with more projects planned to follow.

Florence sculpture installed

A sculpture of Nottinghamshire's first woman MP, Florence Paton, has been installed in Carlton Representing the Rushcliffe Constituency from 1945-1950, which at the time included Gedling, Colwick and Carlton within its boundaries, Florence campaigned for better working conditions in mines as well as for health services for woman and children. A former school teacher, she was particularly interested in the education of children who had special education needs, and fought for their rights for equal treatment and resources.

The stainless steel bust has visual references that represent Florence Paton's beliefs and life work. It was installed in the Garden for the Blind on Carlton Hill on International Women's Day in March.

Designed by sculptor Hilary Cartmel, it includes details of miner's picks and a lamp to show Florence Paton's connection to the borough, books to represent her work with education and the Crowned Portcullis, the official logo of the Houses of Parliament to represent her role as a Member of Parliament.

Housing options for council

Cabinet members have approved proposals for a business case to see if Gedling Borough Council could become a housing company.

We're looking at the implications of setting up a housing limited company to help accelerate the need for new homes in the borough.

The business case which will explore the establishment of a local housing company to create a mix of affordable, rented and for sale homes controlled by the council.

If approved, the business case would be prepared setting out the financial, resource and risk implications of different housing delivery models for Gedling.

The plans are part of the council's strategy for increasing income whilst dealing with severe budget cuts from central government. Gedling Borough Council is one of the worst affected council's in the UK when it comes to government funding cuts and this business case could help reduce the strain on council resources, whilst providing much needed new homes.

Arnold Market has had new some new temporary stalls installed and work has begun to demolish the old buildings and create space for the next phase of works. To celebrate the introduction of the new stalls, events are planned throughout the summer which are all available to view on our website. The flea market is also getting bigger and better with a host of new stallholders taking part in the market every Wednesday evening.

The new stalls and events are part of the council's ongoing work to revitalise the market and Arnold town centre. The council acquired the market last summer and has been working to improve its appearance, increasing the use for community events and activities and working with market traders to widen and increase the choice of goods and services available.

The market runs every Tuesday, Friday and Saturday from 8.30am – 3pm and the Flea Market is every Wednesday from 6pm.

The market improvement has been boosted by a bid for £1.25 million of funding from the N2 Town Centre Fund - part of the Local Growth Fund from the D2N2 Local Enterprise Partnership that supports town centre improvements.

At the end of every financial year, we present to Councillors our annual report that highlights some of the key performance indicators over the last 12 months. We use data from a number of places including customer feedback from the Gedling Conversation, complaints, compliments, employee feedback, MP letters and our own performance indicators to judge how the year has gone.

Areas where we need to improve

Levels of anti-social behaviour are exceeding targets so we're creating a new Neighbourhood Warden post to help reduce this number.

The number of affordable homes built in the borough below target so we need to do more, working with developers to increase this amount over the next 12 months.

97% of fly tips were removed within 4 days

At some point over the past 49 years, this Special Constable has patrolled every division and boundary area across Nottinghamshire and in that time, has seen everything you could imagine, in some cases, things you couldn't imagine.

Just two years into his career, Alan was awarded the Queen's Gallantry Medal for assisting in the arrest of armed robbers who shot at him and another Special Constable colleague following a foot pursuit near to Speinton.

He's personally been responsible for saving the lives of six people, including a two-year-old boy who was choking near to where he was on patrol. He's also arrested two murderers in his time as one of the longest serving Special Constables in Nottinghamshire.

Alan retired in 2014, yet he continues to volunteer, working on Neighbourhood issues across the Gedling Borough area. Alan had dedicated his life to helping others and it was with great pleasure that he was awarded with the Pride of Gedling Lifetime Achievement Award by Leader of the Council, Councillor John Clarke who nominated Alan for the award.









Florence Orchard

This year's Pride of Gedling winner has been part of a Youth Council that has delivered some amazing projects such as challenging mental health and other wellbeing services to young people, advocating for a 'Curriculum For Life' in schools, driving a massive anti-bullying campaign and tackling issues such as knife crime and racial intolerance.

In her capacity as the elected member for Gedling on the Nottinghamshire County Youth Parliament, for over six years from the age of 13 Florence has represented the voice of young people - not only in Gedling, but also at County and National Level, speaking at the despatch box in Parliament about the democratic rights and other concerns of young people.

Under Florence's leadership, the Youth Council has gone from strength to strength, increasing its membership from 11 to 30 members and rising. Her determination, drive and exceptional ability to stand up for the rights of young people made her a very worthy winner of this year's overall Pride of Gedling award and we are very excited about her future. Maybe one day, we will see her representing Gedling at the very highest level. Congratulations Florence!

Meet your newly elected Councillors

In May, we held the local elections to decide the 41 Councillors who will represent the 19 wards that make up the borough of Gedling. The Labour Party retained control of the council, increasing their majority by 4 seats. They now have 29 seats, the Conservatives have 8 seats, the Liberal Democrats have 2 seats and there are 2 new Independent Councillors sitting on the council. The council decide on how your services are provided including how the budget is spent and how much your council tax will be every year.

The council will continue to be led by Councillor John Clarke and the Deputy Leader role will also continue to be held by Councillor Michael Payne. They have selected who their cabinet members will be and what their responsibilities are, these are detailed on page 15.

Youth Council set their agenda

Now in its third term, the Gedling Borough Youth Council is going from strength to strength continuing its work to highlight important issues for young people in the borough. As part of the Youth Council's development, it has, for the first time, appointed a Youth Mayor who will support the Mayor of Gedling on some of her engagements around the borough over the next year.

The inaugural Youth Mayor was appointed at the Council's Annual General Meeting in May and it will be Abigail Hutchinson. Abigail was elected to the Gedling Youth Council in April 2016, representing Arnold Hill Academy, and was duly re-elected for a second term in April 2018. During her term of office, Abigail has been a leading light and a driving force in championing young people's issues and concerns, and is an outstanding role model for the young people of Gedling and is an excellent choice for the first ever Youth Mayor of Gedling.

The outgoing chair of the Youth Council, Florence Orchard, was recognised for her outstanding work when she picked up the prestigious overall Pride of Gedling Award this year, you can read more about her success on pages 8-13. Following in Florence's footsteps will be Husna Iqbal who has been appointed as the new Gedling Youth Council Chair and County Youth Parliament representative at Westminster.

What is on the Youth Council agenda this year?

The Youth Council have a number of projects lined up for the new term including a knife crime working group working with local Police and the council to tackle the issue of knives and young people. Part of this includes creating a short film to raise awareness of the issues with knife crime in Nottinghamshire. The group are working with the council and Police to produce the film which will be aimed at young people in the borough.


