No to 'Super Council' plans



91% of residents against plans to abolish Gedling Borough Council

Over 9,000 households had their say on Nottinghamshire County Council's plans to abolish Gedling Borough Council and 91.2% of the respondents said they did not want to see this happen. It was the largest response to a consultation we've ever received and you were very clear on your views about plans for one 'super council' for Nottinghamshire.

In total we received 9,364 responses, online and by paper to the consultation. We also received comments on social media and directly to councillors showing support to keep Gedling Borough Council as it is. Nottinghamshire County Council had put forward a motion to scrap all the borough and district councils in order to create a 'super council'.

A business case was planned to be presented to County Councillors in December 2018 but was

withdrawn the day before County Councillors were due to meet to vote on the plans.

We would like to thank everyone who took part in the survey - be it online, by post or face to face.

Your views matter to us and now you've spoken we have passed these results back to Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottingham City Council and the Government to make sure you are heard and listened to on this issue.

We will continue to work together with our neighbouring councils across Nottinghamshire in order to deliver the best possible services for you but this consultation has shown that you want us to continue to provide your services locally and we will continue to do that.

Council budget 2019/20

This year's budget has been announced which includes a council tax freeze and investment in the borough to tackle knife crime, anti-social behaviour, fly tipping, dog fouling and street cleanliness.

The budget, agreed at Full Council in March, included the introduction of a new Rapid Response Cleaning Team to strengthen efforts to deal with litter, dog fouling and fly tipping as well as plans to employ an additional Neighbourhood Warden to help tackle knife crime and anti-social behaviour in the borough.

A new Empty Homes Officer post will be created to support the work done last year to bring empty homes back into use, reducing the number of 'eye-sore' properties in the borough.

A new Town Centre and Markets Manager post will be created to help lead and coordinate work on Arnold Market and Carlton Square regeneration and investment projects in the town centres. 50 new bins will also be installed across the borough's towns and villages to help reduce street littering. Free two hour car parking at all council owned car parks will also continue and there will be a substantial car park extension provided at the popular Gedling Country Park.

A £10,000 budget will be set aside to help the council continue to be a plastic clever council. The money will be invested in new public water fountains to go alongside the recently installed ones at Gedling Country Park and Arnot Hill Park.

The 2019/20 budget will contain plans to deliver £2.6m of efficiency savings over the next four years. These savings are expected to come from improved use of digital technology for services, management review and a reduction in corporate costs. In terms of Government defined 'spending power' Gedling Borough Council is now the 2nd worst affected Council in the country. Gedling Borough Council has received a 66% cut in its core funding as a result of cuts from central Government since 2010.

Gedling Access Road

Plans for the new Gedling Access Road are progressing well and it is hoped work on site could start later this year and for it to be open to traffic by 2020.

The £40 million road will be built between the B684 Mapperley Plains and the A612 Trent Valley Road / Nottingham Road unlocking potential new developments in Gedling, creating new jobs and more affordable housing on the former Gedling Colliery site. It will also provide a bypass link to the east of Gedling reducing traffic flows along the Arnold Lane corridor to ease traffic congestion, particularly along Shearing Hill and Main Road in Gedling village. The new road will help to create journey time savings and other benefits worth at least £73m.

Gedling Borough Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, Homes England, Keepmoat Homes, D2N2 Enterprise Partnership and Via East Midlands are all working together to create the access road.

A new crossing

A new crossing on Arnold Lane has been approved following concerns about road safety from local councillors and residents living on the new Chase Farm estate on Arnold Lane. The crossing, which will be provided by Nottinghamshire County Council, should be completed by April 2020 and is expected to cost in the region of £125,000. Its exact location will be decided by a County Council feasibility study.



Ready-made homes on Chase Farm

New ready-made homes which cost a fraction of normal homes have been delivered to the Chase Farm housing site next to the new access road. The homes, built by ILKE, were delivered to the

site in "blocks" already built and fully finished. The modular homes aim to help tackle the national housing shortage due to the speediness of their creation. There will be six homes of this kind on the Chase Farm site with the starting price of £180,950.


Improvements on the way for Carlton Square

As part of our promise to improve our local town centres, we are working with the owners of Carlton Square shopping precinct to see how the centre can be revitalised.

We are working with Waypoint, the company which manages Carlton Square, about how we can improve the shopping centre and the parking areas, which are owned by us. Plans include upgraded paving, lighting, seating and making changes to the parking and servicing layouts to create a more attractive shopping environment. There are also plans to improve the main entrances to the centre and tackle unattractive

and blank building fronts. We have already purchased and demolished a building within the parking area so the improvements can begin.

The cost of the scheme is anticipated to be funded by Waypoint, Gedling Borough Council and supported by grant funding, subject to an application to the D2N2 N2 Town Centre Fund. The views of retailers, shoppers and residents will be important in shaping the centre and once draft plans are available consultation will start. FINES "PILE UP" FOR FLY-TIPPER

A property developer has been ordered to pay over £3,600 in costs and fines after being caught fly tipping tonnes of soil by an eagle-eyed Neighbourhood Warden.

Neighbourhood Wardens, whilst on patrol, spotted a truck in transit carrying soil similar to some dumped the day before on the former Earl of Chesterfield site, Carlton. The wardens decided to follow the truck and then witnessed it go to the Earl of Chesterfield site and dump more soil then drive off from the scene. The wardens checked the licence plate of the vehicle and found it had been rented to a property developer who was building a property nearby.

The following day, the council received reports of another fly tipping incident at Mapperley Golf Course,

where another large amount of soil had been fly tipped, blocking the public access. The fly tip at the golf course was witnessed by a resident who saw soil being collected from the development site and dumped on the grounds at approximately 11.30pm on the same day the wardens witnessed soil being dumped in Carlton.

Following an investigation by the wardens and an interview under caution, the property developer appeared at Nottingham Magistrates' Court where he pleaded guilty to both incidents. He was ordered to pay £3,600 in costs and fines.

Talking shop

The Arnold Shop Watch Radio Scheme, which has been in operation for nearly 15 years, will have new digital radios thanks to funding granted to Gedling Borough Council. Large chain stores Asda and Sainsbury's, shops and licensed premises are all signed up to the scheme which let's them communicate with each other and our CCTV control room to report any anti-social behaviour or suspicious activity.

Gedling Borough Council received £10,000 from the Police and Crime Commissioner as part of its Community Safety Service. The new digital radio system, replacing the current analogue system, will increase the quality of communications between shops, promoting the sharing of information within the business community.

So far, 35 radios have been distributed in known hot spot areas on Front Street, Arnold and in licensed premises in the town centre. The radios feed directly to our control room where they can monitor CCTV and update the store owners. The radios are being upgraded at the same time as new CCTV cameras have been installed on Smithy Crescent, Arnold in response to a recent increase in crime and anti-social behaviour in the area.





Hot desks for local charities

An initiative to give away free 'hot desk' space for local charities has been launched in Arnold by Eagle's Nest Community Action Group in association with Gedling Borough Council.

This charity hub aims to link local third sector organisations to each other under one roof, with office facilities, wifi and space for meetings or appointments in the very heart of Arnold at Arnot Hill House.

This proactive charity also took over the management of Arnold Hill Community Centre, now Eagle's Nest Community Centre in 2017 and now run a thriving venue for local classes, kids and youth groups, parties, and community social groups. Around 500 people use the centre every week.

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW

Inside this Contacts, you'll find important information about the local elections taking place on Thursday 2 May 2019

On Thursday 2 May there will be elections to Gedling Borough Council and elections in some of the Borough's parish councils.

For the borough council, elections will be on ward boundaries introduced in 2015. For some, that could mean a different polling station to that you've voted at before. On the next few pages you can learn about how to register to vote and where each ward is situated in the borough.

Information about the local election

In Gedling there are 41 Gedling Borough councillors representing 19 wards.

Most wards are represented by 2 councillors. Some wards have 3 councillors, some have 1 councillor but the number of councillors always reflects the number of voters in each ward.

On the following pages, we've shown the 2019 wards and the nearby landmarks to help you identify, which ward you live in.




WARDS FOR GEDLING



The borough is made up of 19 wards, five of those are rural wards. In the rural wards there are 11 seats to be contested. In the urban areas of Arnold and Carlton there are 30 seats making a total of 41 seats for the council.

ELECTION FAQS

WHO WILL I BE VOTING FOR?

On 2 May 2019 there will be elections for Gedling Borough Council and any Parish Councils where local councillors will be elected. This is different to a General Election where you would vote for your Member of Parliament.

Local Councillors represent their ward on the Borough Council. Whichever party has the most councillors forms the administration. If there is no clear winner then it will be up to the newly elected councillors to decide who forms an administration. Local Councillors make decisions on issues such as planning, licensing and how local services such as waste collection are run.

WHO CAN VOTE IN THE ELECTIONS?

Anybody who is 18 or over on the 2 May 2019 is eligible to vote. You must, however, be registered to vote. To check if you are on the register contact the elections office on **0115 901 3917 elections@gedling.gov.uk**

WHO CAN VOTE?

If you are a British, EU or Commonwealth citizen, you are entitled to vote at these elections and are not affected by the United Kingdom's withdrawal from the European Union.



ELECTION FAQS



HOW DO I VOTE?

Everyone on the register will be sent a poll card. The card will give information about the election and where you need to go to cast your vote. Please read this carefully as a small number of polling stations will have changed since the last election. Information on how to vote will be displayed in polling stations or you can ask the staff. If you cannot attend your polling station on Thursday 2 May you can apply for a postal or proxy vote.



POSTAL AND PROXY VOTES

If you are unable or do not want to vote in person at the election you can apply for a postal or proxy vote. If you have a postal vote we will send ballot papers to your home address for you to complete and send back to us. A proxy vote is where you give somebody else permission to go to the polling station and vote on your behalf. Postal and proxy votes can apply for this election only or for all future elections and you must fill in and sign an application form. For security you will need to provide your date of birth and a signature.

Application forms are available to download at www.gedling.gov.uk/elections or contact us for one to be sent. The deadline to apply to vote by post is 5pm on Friday 15 April. For proxy votes, the deadline is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April.

You need to provide a few details to register – including your national insurance number and date of birth. This is to make the electoral register more secure.

A clear path for Netherfield

Funding provided by WREN and Gedling Homes will be used to renovate, widen and tidy up the cinder pathway which runs from Manvers Street to Ashwell Street in Netherfield.

WREN which is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community, conservation and heritage projects is providing a total of £84,117 towards the project. Gedling Homes, now part of the Jigsaw group, is also providing a contribution of £9,074.28 towards the refurbishment of the pathway.

The new pathway will provide a safer and cleaner access route for pedestrians when accessing the railway station. The path will receive improved lighting and the vegetation in the area will be cut back and tidied.

Work began earlier this year following assessments on the ecological impact on any works carried out to protect wildlife living on the path.

The local heritage of the cinder path will be told along the pathway with plans for interpretation panels to be installed alongside health and wellbeing messages.

The path is expected to be finished in April 2019 and the Mayor of Gedling will be hosting an opening ceremony once it is ready.

Renewable rubbish

We're working alongside Eastcroft Energy, a facility for residual waste treatment, which burns waste to produce electricity. The facility diverts at least 95% of Gedling Borough's excess waste from landfill and generates electricity and reduces greenhouse gas emissions.

Households in the borough produce around 47,000 tonnes of waste per year and, despite excellent recycling and composting rates, there is still excess waste which cannot be recycled. This is the rubbish that makes its way into your black bins and goes to landfill.

There are lots of reasons to avoid landfill, including environmental and health issues. There is a Landfill Tax of £88.95 per tonne, meaning if we sent all of our waste to landfill last year, it would have cost taxpayers over £4 million, so it's important we reduce our landfill amounts.

The waste is used to replace fossil fuels, with Eastcroft acting as a power plant to generate energy and supply electricity to the local grid through Enviroenergy, a district heating scheme, which is the largest of its kind in the UK.

The Enviroenergy facility provides heat and power to around 4,500 domestic properties and large business buildings including The National Ice Centre, Nottingham Magistrates' Court and Victoria Centre as well as other buildings in the city centre.

Hundreds missing out on vital NHS advice to reduce diabetes risk



The latest figures from the NHS show hundreds of Gedling residents are missing out on a free service to reduce their risk of developing Type 2 diabetes.

Around 480 local patients have not taken up their place on the 'Healthier You' programme, despite being referred by their GP following a blood test.

'Healthier You' is a flagship diabetes prevention programme to help people to achieve a healthy weight, improve nutrition and increase their levels of physical activity – all of which are proven to prevent the condition.

The programme is completely free of charge and runs at different times and venues across the local area.

Local GP, Dr James Hopkinson said: "Type 2 diabetes is a leading cause of blindness, kidney disease and foot

amputations and doubles your risk of heart attacks and strokes.

"Whilst Type 1 cannot be prevented and is not linked to lifestyle, Type 2 is largely preventable through lifestyle changes.

"Although people may feel completely well, it is really important to take action to reduce your risk of developing Type 2 diabetes by joining the 'Healthier You' programme'.

More than 8,000 people in the East Midlands have already taken part in the programme and by making a few simple adjustments to their lifestyle many have seen some really positive results and are no longer at risk of diabetes.


We offer a number of specialist sessions at our leisure centres for people with health conditions, accessibility needs and disabilities.

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This year we're celebrating 100 years of Arnot Hill Park. Although the park and house were originally built in 1792, it wasn't until 1919 that the park was opened to the public and began its journey to becoming one of our resident's favourite places.

Over the years the park has undergone many changes and additions including stables, greenhouses, putting green, a boathouse and tennis courts; the park was even used as a hospital by the Red Cross Society during the First World War.

Other additions to the park included the rose garden and rock arch. Permits were available to fish in the lake and live music could be heard from the band stand on the lawns in front of the house.

A lot has changed since the park first opened and it has continued to evolve; the Civic Centre was built

there and in more recent years, a new children's play area, skate park and wooden carvings have been created. Not only is the park a Green Flag Award winning park, Arnot Hill House is also a Grade II listed building and was the birthplace of Thomas Hawksley, known as the greatest water engineer of the nineteenth century.
